American Arborvitae-Grows to 40 ft. Evergreen foliage is scale like and flat. Grows well in ordinary soil. Well suited for windbreaks and privacy borders.

Eastern Red Cedar-A dense pyramidal evergreen growing 40-50ft. Medium green needles are flat and scale like. Exfoliating handsome grayish to reddish brown bark. Good for screens.

Canadian Hemlock-Short, soft light yellow green needles in spring changing to glossy dark green. Likes moist, organic well-drained soils. Tolerates shade well. Does not tolerate drought and wind.

Colorado Blue Spruce – A handsome ornamental specimen or use as a dense, colorful screen or windbreak. Does well in ordinary soil with average moisture and full sun. Color in Colorado Blue Spruce is influenced by spacing and soil fertility.

Norway Spruce – This graceful conifer has sharp, shiny dark green needles, and beautiful spreading branches with drooping twigs. An extremely hardy tree that is successful under most soil conditions. Use as a Christmas tree, an ornamental specimen, or a protective windbreak. Fast growth makes the Spruce ideal for timber.

Douglas Fir – A splendid evergreen with short-stalked flat, dark green or bluish green needles, ¾' to 1-1/4" long. Bears cones at maturity 2" to 4' long. A rapid grower, hardy tree that grows well in a variety of soils, but does best in deep well-drained soils. Good for Christmas tree or can be sheared as a hedge.

Concolor Fir – An evergreen with flat, varying, soft green to deep blue needles, 1 ½ - 2" long, bearing cones 3" to 5" long at maturity. A very hardy tree growing in a variety of well-drained soils, standing dryness and high temperatures better than other firs. Rapid grower after becoming established.

Scotch Pine – Beautiful evergreen with rigid, bluish green needles. A vigorous growing, hardy plant, adjusts itself to dry soils. Easily transplanted. One of the fastest-growing of the pine family. Popular for Christmas tree producers, a good ornamental for specimen planting. Excellent for windbreak use.

White Pine – Known for its bluish color and long needles, this White Pine is popular as both a Christmas tree and ornamental. Requires early shearing to produce a top quality Christmas tree.

Red Maple – Grows to a height of 60-70 feet. The green summer leaves turn to shades of red, orange, and yellow in the fall. Tolerates damp soil and is commonly planted as an ornamental. Best growth in wet places.

White Oak – Grows 80-100 feet tall and 3-4 feet in diameter with a wide spreading crown. The gray bark is in narrow, vertical blocks of scaly plates. Leaves have a purple-red fall color. Valuable wood for furniture and hardwood floors.

Paper Birch-Grows 80 feet in height. Bark starts to turn bright white in 4 to 6 years. Does best in cool and moist locations.

Wild Black Cherry- Grows to 60 ft. Prefers rich, deep moist soil. Excellent firewood and wild life food.

White Flowering Dogwood-Blooms in early spring with white-petaled flowers. Excellent ornamental that grows 15 to 40 feet tall.

Eastern Redbud-Height 20 to 30 feet. Spread 25 to 35 feet. Flowers are reddish purple in bud opening to a pinkish tinge in early spring.

American Chestnut – Certified pure American Chestnut seedlings that mature to produce abundant, delicious nuts in 7-10 years. Two seedlings should be planted within 50 yards of each other for proper pollination and nut production. Not blight resistant but should live 10-30 years before becoming blighted.

English Lavender-Compact form of lavender. Very aromatic with small bright lavender blue flowers. Semi-evergreen, aromatic foliage. Height 12 to 16 inches, spread between 12 and 24 inches.

Black Knight Butterfly Bush-Dark midnight blue flowers attract hummingbirds and butterflies. Grows to a height of 5-7 ft. Plant in full sun, well drained soil.

Dwarf Alberta Spruce-A dwarf pyramidal evergreen. Densely set with light green needles, very tight compact growth. Slow growing, 2-4 inches per year. Good for small areas and planters.

Butterfly and Hummingbird Mix – Beautiful new mix of native and non-native wildflowers and grasses designed to attract nectar loving birds and insects. A one ounce package will seed an area of 200-250 square feet.

English Ivy-Height 6 to 8 inches when used as a ground cover. Rich dark green glossy three lobed leaves make dense covering. Is evergreen year round.

Pachysandra- Grows in sun and shade to uniform height of 6 to 12 inches. Green and leaves trailing, vine type of ground cover. White flowers in March to early April. Plant 6 inches apart.
