



American Arborvitae – Broad-based, upright, conical to pyramidal shaped often single-trunked, evergreen tree. Green, scale-like foliage in flat sprays that does not yellow in the winter. Great for windbreaks, screening, and tall hedges. Grows 25-40 feet high by 10-15 feet wide in sun to part shade.



Douglas Fir- Native to the western United States, this is a symmetrical, narrow, conical evergreen conifer. It typically grows to 40-80' tall and 12-20' wide. Beautiful Christmas tree, picturesque ornamental, great in masses for screening.



Eastern Red Cedar – A broadly conical, sometimes columnar, dense, evergreen conifer with horizontal branching that typically grows to 30-65' tall by 8-25' wide. Trunks are often fluted at the base. Heartwood is reddish-brown and aromatic, and is commonly used for cedar chests. Tolerates a wide range of soils and growing conditions, from swamps to dry rocky glades. Grow in full sun.



Grand Fir – One of the tallest firs in the world, Grand Fir can grow to 250' in its native Northwest but to around 150' in most other areas. This rapidly growing tree loves cool, moist areas slightly acidic soils in full sun to part shade. Ideal for river bottomlands and valleys. It's leaves emit a balsamy, tangerine smell when crushed and were used as a tea for colds by Native Americans.



Scotch Pine – A majestic evergreen, this very hardy pine grows to 50-80' tall x 20-40' wide. Needles are soft and bluish green in color, bark is thin, smooth and greenish-brown, darkening as tree matures. With adequate moisture, growth can be 12-18" per year. Ideal for specimen planting, shade, and windbreaks.



Serbian Spruce - A stunning, graceful landscape tree. Beautiful as a single garden specimen or in groupings. Narrow, pyramidal, spire-like tree with pendant branches that ascend at the tips. Flattened bright green needles have silvery undersides. It grows to 50-60' tall by 15-20' wide in full sun to part shade.



American Elderberry – Great for jellies, syrups, pies, wines, and brandies. Native to eastern North America. It is a deciduous, somewhat sprawling, suckering shrub that typically grows to 5-12' tall. Prefers medium to wet, well-drained soils in full sun to part shade but tolerates a wide range of soils. Spreads by root suckers to form colonies.



American Redbud – A small flat-topped tree, producing purple blooms on bare stems in early spring. Foliage is large and heart shaped, changing to yellow in the fall. Does well in a protected location. Stunning in spring bloom.



Black Gum - Also known as Tupelo or Sour Gum is a slow-growing, deciduous, native tree which occurs in a wide range of soils. A stately tree with a straight trunk and rounded crown (more pyramidal when young) that typically grows 30-50' tall, by 20-30' wide. Non showy flowers are an excellent source of nectar for honey bees. Spectacular scarlet fall color.



Pin Oak – The most stately and colorful of the Oak Trees. It is a medium sized tree that typically grows 50-70' tall by 40-60' wide with a broad pyramidal crown primarily native to the Midwest and mid-Atlantic States. Great street or landscape tree.



Red Osier Dogwood- is an upright spreading, suckering shrub that typically grows to 6-9' tall with a slightly larger spread. Thrives in wet swampy areas, wetland margins or along lakes and rivers. Leaves turn red to orange in autumn. Reddish stems turn bright red in winter and are particularly showy against a snowy backdrop. Tiny, fragrant, white flowers give way to clusters of whitish fruit in summer.



River Birch – A vigorous, fast-growing, medium-sized single or multi-stemmed tree with an open habit and gorgeous exfoliating salmon-pink to reddish brown bark showing a lighter inner bark. Native to Eastern US., grows 40-70' tall by 40-60' wide. Great for riverbanks, wet soils and adapts well to clay soils. Beautiful landscape specimen.



Spicebush- A native shrub that grows to 6-12' tall and wide and has greenish-yellow flowers that bloom along the branches in early spring. Flowers of female plants give way to bright red drupes which mature in fall and are attractive to birds. Spicebush is great for borders, shade or woodland gardens, moist areas along streams or ponds, native plant gardens or naturalized plantings. Spicebush tolerates deer, drought, heavy shade, clay soil, wet soil, and Black Walnut.



Sugar Maple- A medium-sized, deciduous tree native to Eastern North America that typically grows 40-80' tall by 30-60' wide with a dense, rounded crown. This is the tree from which Maple syrup is made. Great shade and specimen tree with gorgeous fall color. Not a good street tree due to its shallow roots and intolerance of road salt and urban pollution.



Flowering Dogwood - A small, deciduous flowering tree that typically grows 15-30' tall and wide, with a low-branching, broadly-pyramidal but somewhat flat-topped habit. Bloom occurs in early spring in full sun or part shade.



Everbearing Strawberry Plants- Strawberries are one of the easiest fruits for the home gardener to grow and one of the most rewarding. This perennial blooms spring and summer prior to bearing fruit. Will produce large juicy berries throughout the summer. Comes bare-root.



Asparagus- (Mary Washington) Unlike most vegetables, asparagus plants are perennial, which means the same plants grow in your garden year after year. The spears that we enjoy as a vegetable are the new shoots that emerge in spring. Delicious steamed or roasted. Comes bare-root.
